We heard speeches from two graduates who left the audience speechless as they described the difficulties of their journeys to discover their self-worth and how they learned to live in recovery. We heard from the senior resident about the importance of structure and the power of choices. On top of all of that was the celebrating of the men and their recovery, the main focus of the entire evening. I had the honor of preparing men for the evening's festivities. All twelve men wore a tie and dress shirt.

Many of the men had never experienced a program of this magnitude. 2014 brought change and with that change a new staff member who says he was honored to be included in such an inspirational event. Lionel says, "It was a wonderful event. It was a first time for me attending an event of that nature."

In an effort to help them grasp the significance of the event, I asked the residents to put their thoughts into a two-page paper. During our weekly meeting, I had them read their papers.

It was fascinating to hear the range of emotions experienced by these men. They all enjoyed the event while some were taken aback by the level of love and compassion of strangers. One of the men said he almost reacted badly when a woman hugged him because people never hugged him before without wanting something from him. Some of the other guys enjoyed being celebrated and one felt super special because he got to sit with Judge Ashley and the president of the Board of Directors. I talked with event committee members and board members who shared sentiments of joy and great satisfaction about the evening. Personally, I took away four valuable thoughts.

One, people have an abundance of love and decency. **Two**, stereotypes are meant to be broken. **Three**, people helping people is the foundation of Christianity. **Four**, hope never fails. Men who choose recovery for their lives live every day in hope. In the end, I witnessed a miracle: The miracle on Brown Street. I found myself just looking around the room at the residents' interaction with others. The smiles on their faces and the glimmer in their eyes made the evening very special. I pray that everyone attending took away special memories from this evening that will inspire them to continue supporting Serenity Inns and the residents who are reclaiming their lives. The hard work continues every single day.



WHERE ARE THEY NOW?

(The 17th in a series of interviews with Graduates)

An athlete in high school, Doug McFaul played soccer, was on the wrestling team and an active skateboarder. His path to drugs did not begin until he was eighteen, when, after breaking up with a girlfriend, he tried marijuana and liked it. Over time, his drug use led to OxyContin which soon became his drug of choice. Along the way came four felonies, all drug-related.

Court ordered treatment in 2006 led Doug to the program at the Salvation Army for 7 months where he went through the motions, but more drug use followed.

Doug arrived at Serenity Inn after detox at Genesis Detox in March of 2013 with a new resolve to get clean. This time, also seven months in treatment, he managed to put his life in order as he worked with the counselors and came to realize many things about his drug use. First and foremost, he learned that drugs took away his confidence and his sense of self worth. "Drugs make you small," he said, and convince you that you are "not a good person." He recalls crying about this feeling at times when he was using. And he now realizes that his negative attitude meant he tended to give up on things.

Now 34 years old and an October 2013 graduate of SI, he has been working third shift at a company in Waukesha as a Quality Control Inspector with a new sense of self-worth. He knows he is one of the best employees on his shift, and part of his job is training new employees.



The third shift job is something of a challenge for Doug because it tends to isolate him during the day when his friends and family members are working, but he tries to go to AA/NA meetings several mornings a week after he gets off work. Lots of hobbies and interests, however, help keep him busy. He enjoys deer hunting (both rifle and bow & arrow), fishing, painting, drawing, and carving driftwood and rocks, among other things.

He is realistic about the temptation to use again. It is so "easy to go back" to drugs, but Serenity Inn gave him tools that help him move forward. He says that if he had not found Serenity Inn he knows he would "not be in a good place today."

Our **10th Anniversary Celebration** held at the Italian Community Center on 4-4-14 was the best yet. We thank all those who helped us net more than \$17,000 to continue the important programming of Serenity Inn.

Fox Point Lutheran Church Family Teaches Children about Giving

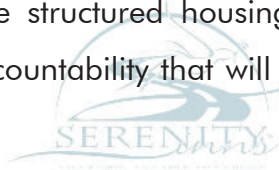
