## WHERE ARE THEY NOW?

(The 21st in a series of Interviews with Alumni)

In recovery now, Rodney Nelson remembers his mother telling him as he grew up, “It’s easy to get in trouble but hard to get out of it.”

Years of addiction have confirmed the truth of her words to Rodney. He started drinking on Senior Ditch Day in high school. The year was 1984, and by 1993 he was using other drugs; by 2000 he went to prison for five years for selling them.

In prison and after his release, he stayed clean for his family, but he realizes now that doing it for them rather than for himself was not the answer.

By the time he arrived at Serenity Inns in August of 2014, he had hit rock bottom. His father had just passed away from cancer, and since Rodney knew him as a man who was against any kind of addiction, he started to feel the guilt of his father dying with him still using drugs. He was the black sheep of the family. After the funeral in Illinois, Rodney told his Heavenly Father, “I am done.”

He returned to Milwaukee and after detox at Genesis Detox came to Serenity Inn upon the recommendation of a counselor there.

His first time in recovery for himself, Rodney found the help he sought, “Serenity Inn helped me find out who I was—helped me understand I wasn’t responsible for my addiction but I am responsible for my recovery.” He never knew that addiction is a disease, and he had come to believe he was too old to get clean.

He is grateful to have learned the tools of patience and compassion in one-on-one counseling with Lionel and in doing writing assigned as part of the programming. The staff at Serenity Inns ‘loved me until I learned to love myself,’ Rodney said.

He is grateful for the “mother wit” of Miss Ellen who helped him to stop acting on impulse. Her advice: “Stop letting people rent space in your head!” Witnessing her dedication to all she does, he also credits her with helping him with his work ethic.

From the volunteers who bring dinner every night and listen to the residents’ stories he found models of compassion and love. He appreciates that the volunteers also learn what addicts and alcoholics go through and in some cases better understand what a loved one may be dealing with.

He's learned that recovery is a process, that when an individual is chemically dependent, he doesn't think clearly. Looking back, he knows he acted almost insanely at times.

Since January 2, Rodney has had a steady job that he enjoys. In the near future, he hopes to get additional training to do tool and die or similar work that is less physically demanding as he nears the age of 50.

He has rebuilt relationships with his family, especially with his 3 teenage children in Milwaukee and with their mother and also with his siblings and his mother in Illinois, and he is taking care of traffic tickets in Illinois so that he can get back his driver's license.

It has not been easy, but Rodney is well on his way to getting out of the trouble his addiction brought into his life.

After expenses, the evening earned over \$20,000 to further the programming of Serenity Inns.

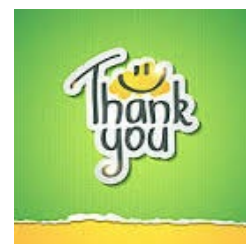
